December 12, 2014 Excerpts from an email from Lisa Maatz, Vice President of Government Relations

This past year—and this past week, especially—has pretty much been a national teach-in on the issue of campus sexual violence.

For all the <u>attention</u> that's been paid to the <u>Rolling Stone article</u> about <u>gang rape allegations</u> at the University of Virginia, I fear that many commentators, school officials, students, and others who care about campus safety do not understand that <u>schools</u> <u>have a legal responsibility</u> to respond to campus sexual assault as a civil rights issue.

As I wrote in the <u>Huffington Post</u> this week, schools' role in responding to campus sexual assault is essential, because students' civil rights—an equal opportunity to education—are on the line. Rampant sexual violence creates a campus climate that is hostile to students, especially women. When students aren't safe, they can't learn. Civil rights are violated, and schools are on the hook.

That isn't just my opinion; the federal law known as <u>Title IX</u> which AAUW strongly advocated for and continues to promote vigorous enforcement of—prohibits such sex discrimination in all federally funded educational programs. The problem at hand is not whether schools have a role to play but rather that some schools are not meeting their requirements under Title IX—rules that have been around for more than 40 years.

Smart schools understand that Title IX, successfully implemented, is the very tool they need to improve campus climates for everyone. Title IX isn't a new kid on the block; what's new is the increased attention being put on campus sexual assault by students, advocates, the U.S. Department of Education, Congress, and the media, combined with the increasing pressure on universities to face up to their responsibilities.

<u>It's on all of us</u> to keep the spotlight bright to help ensure that all schools follow the law and protect students' civil rights. We must hold schools accountable—one way to do this is by checking a school's annual security report, which explains its compliance with new campus safety regulations that were <u>fi-</u> <u>nalized</u> in October.

Consider stopping by the website of your alma mater, local college or university, or the school your kids/friends/relatives attend, and type in "annual security report" in the search bar. The report should show up and have been updated on or by October 1. <u>Visit AAUW's blog</u> to learn more about what information to look for in these security reports.

AAUW will continue to lead on this issue and work with our allies to ensure students' civil rights are protected, and I will continue to keep you up to date. Thank you for your support.

For the First Time, FBI Releases Hate Crime Statistics Motivated By Gender, Gender Identity

On Monday, the FBI released its annual publication *Hate Crime Statistics 2013* detailing reported hate crimes by states, cities, towns, and colleges and universities. For the first time, this report included data on hate crimes motivated by gender and gender identity, as required under the <u>Matthew Shepard</u> and James Byrd Jr. Hate Crimes Prevention Act. The report indicated there were 18 gender bias-motivated incidents nationwide, 13 of which were anti-female. The report also revealed that the total number of hate crimes in 2013 decreased from 6,573 to 5,928 incidents, the lowest number of reported incidents since 1991 (the first year of reporting). While the hate crimes statistics are useful, many jurisdictions reported incomplete or inaccurate data, indicating there is still work left to be done to capture the scope of the problem nationwide.

House Narrowly Passes \$1 Trillion Government Funding Bill

On Thursday evening, 162 Republicans and 57 Democrats in the House teamed up to <u>approve</u> a massive spending bill to avoid another government shutdown. The bill includes good, bad, and ugly provisions for AAUW public policy priorities. The bill will increase funding for <u>Pell grants</u>, which AAUW supports, but will also increase funding for <u>abstinence-only education</u> and allow individuals to circumvent long-standing campaign finance laws—two policies AAUW strongly opposes. The \$1 trillion spending bill will now move on to the Senate and is <u>ex-</u> <u>pected to pass</u> as early as tonight. The Obama administration <u>indicated</u> yesterday that it supports the funding bill in spite of what it called "the inclusion of ideological and special interest riders."

Senators Vocalize Support for Title IX at Hearing on Campus Sexual Violence

A Senate Judiciary subcommittee held a <u>hearing</u> on Tuesday to examine the issue of campus sexual violence. AAUW attended the hearing, in which senators vocalized their support for Title IX and stressed the need for schools to follow the law. Senators also discussed strategies to improve the response of local law enforcement and their coordination and communication with schools.

AAUW Cheer of the Week

In what might be our first posthumous "Cheer of the Week," today we recognize Albert Einstein, who we recently learned wrote a letter of support to Nobel Laureate Marie Curie in 1911 when she was denied a seat as a physicist in the French Academy of Sciences. Einstein wrote that he was "so enraged by the base manner in which the public is presently daring to concern itself with you" and that he considered "himself lucky to have made [Curie's] personal acquaintance."
