Only 60 percent of eligible voters cast their ballots in 2016.

The right to vote is an essential part of our democracy. During the 2016 election voters in many states faced <u>new restrictions</u> at the polls. Without the protections of the Voting Rights Act (which was <u>weakened</u> in a 2013 U.S. Supreme Court decision), new laws were enacted, producing a chaotic voting environment that confused voters and created unnecessary barriers to the ballot box. Voter suppression tactics such as voter identification laws make it increasingly difficult for Americans to vote – particularly people of color, older people, lowincome people, and those living in rural America, some of whom may not have driver's licenses or any means of obtaining one. Women are also affected by these laws: For example, many women have changed their names after marriage but have not updated their ID cards to reflect that change. We need Congress to act now to uphold the fundamental right to vote.

Urge your members of Congress to protect voting rights.

The Fall Membership and Tech Trek luncheon, September 23rd recognized five girls who had been selected for the 2017 Tech Trek summer camp at Stanford, Camp Hopper.

It was a wonderful get together after a summer hiatus. Jane Amaral introduced the five girls who were excited to share with Members a few of their experiences from the week long camp. Each had picked a specific math or science area on which to concentrate, from Astronomy to Marine Biology and more.

To further add to the Members' STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering Math) knowledge, UCSC's Psychology Chair, Dr. Campbell Leaper and his Graduate Assistant Christine Starr shared details of their recent studies with high school students STEM motivation through student internships at UCSC; girls' involvement in STEM -related extra-curricular programs and exploring how biology classroom experiences may predict undergraduate women's and underrepresented students' sense of belonging and motivation in STEM. A spirited Q and A followed the talk enjoyed by the attendees.

We are very grateful to Jean Gregson, Jamie Muzzio and Lynn Cummins for their donations to Tech Trek at the luncheon.

Research indicates it could be 102 years before women are paid as much as men.

New data show that women working full time in the United States typically are <u>paid just 80 percent of</u> <u>what non-Hispanic white men are paid</u>. Because of the <u>gender pay gap</u> women have less disposable income with which to repay their <u>student loans</u>, leaving them paying more and for a longer time than men. These setbacks compound over a lifetime and can lead to families' financial insecurity. That's why AAUW is fighting to close the pay gap by offering <u>salary negotiation workshops</u>; providing <u>case support</u> to plaintiffs seeking fair pay; and <u>advocating</u> legislative action on equal pay at the federal, state, and local levels.
