President's message:

November 28, 1881 was a fateful day.

Marion Talbot, the first woman to receive a degree in Chemistry, had been corresponding with Ellen Swallow Richards, first woman to graduate from MIT. Frustrated by lack of opportunity for women, the two women invited 15 alumnae from eight colleges to meet in Boston, and *The Association of Collegiate Alumnae or ACA (AAUW's predecessor organization)* was founded. Committed to overcoming barriers to women's education and advancement, the movement spread rapidly.

They faced astonishing discrimination. At that time, it was widely believed that a woman attending college would become infertile, a myth advanced by Harvard-educated physician, Edward Clarke. An ACA committee sent questionnaires to 1,290 members, and showed definitively that higher education did not harm women's health. The data was published in 1885, the start of many research projects conducted by AAUW in its history. (Fun fact: in 1919, the ACA helped raised \$156,413 to purchase a gram of radium for Marie Curie to continue her work.)

In the 1900s, quotas limited the number of women permitted to enroll. Women were allowed only certain classes and majors. Florence Bascom, the first woman admitted to graduate school at Johns Hopkins University, had to sit behind a screen so her presence wouldn't "disrupt" male students. Much of AAUW's work has focused on examining and remedying such inequalities.

With its outstanding history, AAUW now has branches in every state. 170,000 members and supporters, more than 100 student organizations, 800 college and university members, AAUW has awarded more than \$100 million to women scholars and their projects. Title IX, which AAUW worked hard to pass, guarantees equal access to federally funded higher education programs and a safe educational environment.

So thank you, Marian Talbot and Ellen Swallow Richards. You were true visionaries.

Thank you, AAUW, for persevering and continuing their work. We are the grateful beneficiaries.

Tech Trek News

What a busy month for Tech Trek!

Our Tech Trek Committee: Jean Gregson, Jane Amaral, Kit Hein, Lynn Barry and Geri Williams met and reviewed all the applications and essays from the 7th grade Santa Cruz girls nominated by their teachers, to compete for AAUW Tech Trek scholarships to Camp Hopper at Stanford.

After hours of deliberation over the girls' submissions, we set up interviews for 19 girls in South county, March 10th and North County on the 17th. As we interview, we will look for girls who not only excel in math and science, and may not have an opportunity for this in depth college our efforts. camp experience, but who are passionate about trying to change You may make your tax deductithe world through STEM.

Once the interviews are completed, we will select six girls and two alternates to represent Santa Cruz County AAUW at Camp Hopper. The scholarship winners will be notified in early April.

We decided that there were such outstanding candidates this year that, for the first time we would send six, rather than 5 girls (as in the past). This will reduce our Branch Tech Trek fund total, leaving little toward next year's, 2019 Camp Hopper commitment.

We fundraise year round to provide the funds for the Tech Trek camp experience. Recently you will have received a request by USPS mail, asking for you to donate to Tech Trek. As the cost for each girl selected to Camp Hopper is \$1000, (which the Branch underwrites), I hope you will continue to generously support Tech Trek efforts for the coming year. 





Human Trafficking Committee News

End **Human Trafficking** Committee is moving forward. Our committee is now working with the District Attorney's office of our county to implement the posting requirements of SB1193. This law requires all designated businesses to post notices describing how and what to do if trafficking is observed. Louden Nelson will host a Human Trafficking workshop, sponsored by law enforcement, on the 24th of March, 11-5: Register at www.coalitiontoendhumantrafficking.org. The public is invited.

Mark your October calendar for an event on October 20th. Shared Hope, a national organization, will provide a speaker, member of DA office, Santa Cruz County Board of Education, and child welfare will comprise a panel to address local concerns. A film "Chosen-A Documentary by Shared Hope International" will be shown. Information on prevention will be the focus.

An ongoing project for the committee is posting the hotline number required by California law in the appropriate locations. We are joined by a group from Faith Community Church. This project requires many volunteers and footwork. We welcome help. Please join us at monthly meeting, 201 Prospect Hts, 1PM, 1st Saturday of month, April 7th.

Will you commit to fighting back for students' rights?



Plain and simple: students should be able to go to schools free from sex discrimination.

But U.S. Secretary of Education Betsy DeVos has <u>already taken action</u> to roll back protections for survivors of sexual assault under the law. The Department of Education has stated that it plans to change Title IX's regulations, which could weaken students' civil rights and federal enforcement of Title IX. They've indicated the process could start as early as this month. We're ready to fight back. Are you?

Instances of sexual violence and discrimination interfere with students' ability to learn, and they have no place in our schools. We must speak out against any attacks on Title IX that attempt to diminish protections for students.
