



Tech Trek News

Tech Trek has been busy!

The big news, of course is our September 15th luncheon at Seascape. It's Tech Trek's 20th Anniversary. We would love to have you share it with us.

More about that later, but first... In late April, Lynn Barry went to the AAUW State Convention and took part in Tech Trek's 20th Anniversary. The Tech Trek Reunion Reception with over 200 attending included former campers, parents, and staff.

Meeting Tech Trekkers from all over the state was beneficial and we will be utilizing many suggestions from the convention.

Fund Raising, always necessary to support AAUW goals and fund the Tech Trek camps was discussed. Branch coordinators noted that to be successful, you must reach companies, which need not be local.

- -Learn who handles corporate giving program and try to meet that person face to face.
- -Ask membership for possible referrals to specific employees, then seek their contact information. -Use Facebook Fundraiser.

School Involvement:

- -Ask Principal for meeting to make presentation to STEM teachers.
- -Enlist aid of District Title IX Coordinator.

Arrange field trip for members to visit camp in session.

The end of June our Tech Trek Committee hosted a dessert party for our six Tech Trek girls (and parents), chosen to attend Camp Hopper at Stanford from July 15-22nd. They were able to meet each other and find out more about the camp from a couple of last year's campers.

Kit Hein and Darby Kremers went to Camp Hopper while the girls were there. They visited the girls and worked all day with the Mad Money project. One of the week's highlights, the program shows girls how to handle finances, pay bills, save money etc. Of course the girls had daily exposure to mentors in STEM fields. Each of the girls has been asked to speak about a specific camp memory at our September 15th luncheon.

This month, new member Susan Chollar (just retired from Aptos Jr) and I met with new County STEM Coordinator, Nehal Pieffer. Susan will share more about our potential coordination with ongoing STEM offerings in county schools at the luncheon, as well as discussing a teacher's role with Tech Trek selection.

Stand Up for Women's Rights: Urge Your Senator to Oppose Judge Kavanaugh

Last month, President Trump nominated Judge Brett Kavanaugh to a lifetime appointment on the U.S. Supreme Court and the stakes are enormously high. Despite the fact that his full record has not been released, the Senate has scheduled his confirmation hearings to begin as soon as September 4. AAUW has carefully <u>considered</u> his available record and one thing is clear: Judge Kavanaugh would put at risk the issues that are central to AAUW's mission.

AAUW <u>advocates</u> for the health, education, and economic security of all women and girls. But Judge Kavanaugh's confirmation would put women's constitutional rights, including access to abortion and contraception, at risk. Judge Kavanaugh has also called into question the protections of the Affordable Care Act, and his record shows that he is willing to do grave harm to women by upending employment and labor rights and restricting voting rights. We cannot support a nominee who will not uphold and protect our most fundamental freedoms and rights.

Judge Kavanaugh's Senate confirmation hearings will begin as soon as September 4, and it's vital that every senator hear from their constituents about what's at stake.

3. <u>Share this opportunity with friends and family in key states.</u> The votes of senators in Alabama, Alaska, Indiana, Maine, Missouri, Nevada, North Dakota, and West Virginia are critical. Urge your networks in these key states to <u>make their voices heard</u>.

Judge Kavanaugh has shown he won't stand up for the health, education, and economic security of women and girls — and we won't stand for that. Take action today to oppose Judge Kavanaugh's confirmation to the Supreme Court.

Thank you and congratulations to the members of AAUW

California for your generous donations in 2017 of \$1,336,746.56 to the AAUW Fund. The power of each donation is critical as AAUW strives to break barriers for women and girls in all areas of their lives, from education to health care to pay and employment equity. While much has been accomplished since the founding of AAUW in 1881, our work is far from over. If you haven't explored the AAUW website, we encourage you to do so as there is a wealth of information about AAUW and its many programs.

\$767,718.91 of the donations went to support California Tech Trek camps, the week-long

math/science camps held during the summer at various colleges and universities in California. What a wonderful opportunity for girls entering the eighth grade to explore careers in these fields while being encouraged to further their educations. Because Tech Trek funds will now be administered by the California Special Projects Fund, donations are still tax deductible but won't be included in branch donations to National.

Other programs supported by your donations include the Educational Opportunities Fund

which provides Fellowships and Grants, the Legal Advocacy Fund, providing case support for women in the workplace and in educational institutions, leadership programs such as the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (https://www.nccwsl.org), and groundbreaking research on issues pertaining to women and girls.

It's wonderful that four California endowments were completed in 2017: Half Moon Bay branch (Half Moon Bay), Lucy Lindsey/Margaret Hankle (Hayward-Castro Valley), Helen and Marie Salandra/Friedel Volz (Alhambra San Gabriel and San Jose branches), and the Sacramento branch 100th anniversary. Congratulations!

There are still a few endowments to be completed and we would appreciate your help. The current balances on them will be listed on the AAUW CA website as soon as the figures are received from AAUW.
