Analysis: What the 2018 Midterm Results Mean for Women

The midterm elections ushered in changes at all levels of government: Democrats took control of the U.S. House of Representatives, and Republicans will likely increase their ranks in the U.S. Senate. At the state level, Democrats flipped seven state legislative chambers and picked up at least seven of 26 previously Republican controlled gubernatorial seats.

But the dominant story of this election is the power of women. So far, polling suggests over 52 percent of voters in this election were female, matching their previous turnout record in the 2010 midterms. And not only did a record number of women run for office, a record number of those women will now serve, even as we await more election results. Beating the former high of 112 women set by the current Congress, at least 102 women will be sworn into the U.S. House of Representatives and at least 23 women will serve in the U.S. Senate. Additionally, at least nine women will lead their states as governors.

The country also notched several notable firsts: Nevada elected a female-majority federal delegation, a female-majority state Supreme Court, and, depending on the outcome of some yet-to-be-decided races, may seat the first female-majority state legislature. Here are some examples of a few more firsts:

Sharice Davids (D-KS) and Deb Haaland (D-NM) were elected as the first two Native American women in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Rashida Tlaib (D-MI) and Ilhan Omar (D-MN) were the first Muslim women elected to Congress.

Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez (D-NY) became the youngest woman ever elected to Congress.

Ayanna Pressley (D) became the first African American woman from Massachusetts elected to Congress, while Abby Finkenauer (D) and Cindy Axne (D) were the first women elected to the U.S. House of Representatives from Iowa.

Tennessee will send <u>Marsha Black-burn</u> (R) to the Senate as its state's first woman senator.

Maine and South Dakota elected their first female governors, <u>Janet Mills</u> (D-ME) and <u>Kristi Noem</u> (R-SD), and <u>Michelle Lujan Grisham</u> (D) became New Mexico's first Democratic Latina governor.

These firsts are a reminder that while the number of women in elected positions has increased, we remain far from parity. This progress is critical, but the work is far from over.





It's time to take action for Title IX.

Last year, the administration began its <u>systematic attack</u> on Title IX, and even announced that additional rollbacks were coming. Today, it happened — the Department of Education issued a <u>plan</u> to make sweeping changes to Title IX's regulations, which would have <u>significant implications</u> for students' civil rights and for federal enforcement of the law.

Title IX protects all students from discrimination — students of all genders, from kindergarten through college. But these expansive changes put those protections at risk. We need your help to fight to stop these changes.

It's the Department of Education's job to keep all students safe and to keep schools free from discrimination, including sexual harassment and violence. These proposed changes would weaken Title IX's protections by narrowing the definition of sexual harassment to allow schools to exclude much of the abuse students experience, limiting when schools will respond, and putting in place processes that make it harder for students to come forward when they experience sexual harassment or assault. Simply put, these changes will make schools less safe for students.

Over the next 60 days, we have an opportunity to weigh in with the Department of Education on their proposed changes. It's crucial that advocates speak up — loudly — and fight back against any attacks on Title IX that attempt to diminish students' protections.
