




Membership News

Our Tech Trek committee is currently reviewing the nominated girls's applications and essays. We will be interviewing the girls on March 30 at Seacliff Inn. (This is the second year they have kindly offered use of their Board Room for the interviews and comfortable lobby for parents to wait during the interviews.)

Three committee members interview each girl about their application, their essay, their interests and family. One of our members hosts the parents in the lobby and gets to know a bit more about the girls.

AAUW and our Branch want to make sure that we select girls for the Tech Trek opportunity who have both the interest and passion for Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM); and who might not otherwise have a STEM and camp opportunity such as Camp Hopper.

March 1st is a big day for Tech Trek. That is the day that funds are due for Camp Hopper for the Tech Trek girls that will be selected for the summer 2019 STEM camp.

Through our members' generosity, we have been able to fully fund the camp experience for five girls this year. Thank you Trisha Kett, Darby Kremers and Lynn Cummins for your donations this month.

We were extraordinarily fortunate that one of our members has just pledged to pay the full Tech Trek fee for one of our girls on an annual basis.

This member made her donation this year by a direct donation of her IRA Minimum Required Distribution (referred to as a Qualified Charitable Distribution). She told me that it was very easy to set up. Making donations to qualified charities in this way can be advantageous for several reasons. You may want to speak with your tax consultant about those benefits.

Annual pledges of any amount are very helpful as it enables us to know with certainty how many girls can be offered the Tech Trek experience each year. If you can make an annual pledge of any amount, it would be most appreciated.

We are pleased that Shanna Howard, (Louanne Ellison's grandaughter) has joined our committee. Though she is very busy as a UCSC graduate student and WISE member, she has volunteered to help when she can with the Tech Trek selection and very importantly fund raise. We will count on her for 2020 Tech Trek funds!!!

AAUW Hears from Rep. Jimmy Panetta

Rep. Jimmy Panetta (D-CA; 20th District) addressed the AAUW branches of Santa Cruz County and the Monterey Peninsula over lunch on February 23. The annual AAUW Interbranch Council meeting was held at the Bayonet & Blackhorse Golf Course Grill in Seaside. Mr. Panetta was accompanied by his middle-school-age daughter who, he said, he was happy to expose to the values and goals of AAUW.

The group heard from Mr. Panetta for 30 minutes with a Q&A session following his prepared remarks. Panetta emphasized the importance of constituent relations, stating that his office has a 95 percent success rate in replying to his constituents, both Democratic and Republican. If one doesn't get a reply, he wants to hear about it. He is working tirelessly on Capitol Hill fighting for



legislation to help the Central Coast's agriculture industry, its environment, the quality of education, and equal and civil rights issues. His values seem well aligned with AAUW's values of empowering women and improving the lives of millions of women and their families.

Tell Congress: Support the EMPOWER Act to Fight Workplace Harassment

Far too many barriers prevent survivors from speaking out when they experience harassment in the workplace. As a result, harassment continues to affect workers nationwide and across industries, impacting their success in the workplace, and ultimately, their economic security.

It's time for Congress to strengthen our laws to make it clear that discrimination and harassment have no place in the workplace — and this week, Congress took the first step by introducing the EMPOWER Act.

The EMPOWER Act is a bipartisan, bicameral bill that would improve the lives of workers by reducing barriers to speaking out when harassment occurs, requiring companies to report on workplace harassment and arming workers with resources they need to address workplace harassment.

Women are raising their voices, and they will no longer be silent. Urge your members of **Congress to support the bipartisan EMPOWER** Act and put an end to workplace harassment!

The far reaching effects of harassment on an employee's pay, advancement and well-being cannot be overstated. This is particularly true for women and people of color, who are disproportionately impacted by harassment. By passing the EMPOWER Act, Congress will let survivors know: we hear you, we support you and we will stand by you.

Congress must improve protections against all forms of harassment in the workplace. Urge your members of Congress to support the **EMPOWER Act!**
