Can the remembrance of an improbable friendship heal a nation? No, not by itself.... but it can be a start.

Come on February 27th and join us in our celebration of RBG's legacy.

AAUW's Policy Priorities for the 117th Congress

In January, Kate Nielson, AAUW Director of Public Policy & Legal Advocacy sent a letter to members of Congress which presented AAUW National's federal legislative priorities for the 117th Congress. Excerpts from that letter are below and illustrate AAUW's current policy priorities.

There is much Congress can do to ensure women's fair treatment in our workplaces:

• Swiftly pass the Paycheck Fairness Act (PFA) to update and strengthen the Equal Pay Act of 1963 so that it provides effective protection against sex-based pay discrimination in today's workplace.

- Swiftly pass the Raise Wage Act, which would gradually raise the federal minimum wage until it reaches \$15 an hour and provide for other wage related improvements.
- Support passage of the BE HEARD in the Workplace Act, which provides new protections for workers by restoring workplace protections for older Americans, employees harassed by their supervisors, and workers retaliated against for bringing harassment claims.
- Pass the Ending Monopoly of Power Over Workplace Harassment Through Education and Reporting (EMPOWER) Act to increase transparency and training in the workplace, making it less dangerous for employees to come forward and report inappropriate behavior.
- Barriers to equity in education persist, particularly for women and historically marginalized populations. To address these issues, Congress should:

New White House Gender Policy Council

• Pass the Patsy T. Mink and Louise M. Slaughter Gender Equity in Education Act (GEEA), which provides additional resources, training and technical assistance to educational entities to support compliance with Title IX.

- Pass the Hold Accountable and Lend Transparency on Campus Sexual Violence (HALT) Act which would, among other things, strengthen prevention efforts by our federal government and colleges and universities nationwide to eradicate and respond appropriately to sexual violence and other forms of discriminatory harassment and gender-based violence.
- Pass the STEM Opportunities Act which would combat factors that limit the advancement of women and underrepresented groups in STEM (Science Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) degrees and careers.

AAUW stands unwavering in its commitment to improving the lives of women and their families, and is

ready to serve as a resource to Congress and staff as we work on this progress together.

On January 18th, AAUW CEO Kim Churches issued a statement that "AAUW is thrilled to learn that the Biden-Harris Administration has created a White House Gender Policy Council." According to the Biden administration, the council's aim is "to guide and coordinate government policy that impacts women and girls, across a wide range of issues such as economic security, health care, racial justice, gender-based violence, and foreign policy, working in cooperation with the other White House policy councils." Essentially, this means there will be a government-wide focus on advancing and protecting the rights of people of all genders both here in the United States and abroad.

It will be interesting to watch to work of this Council and see how it fulfills its mission.

When Will the Gender Pay Gap be Closed? 2069? 2369? 2451?

How long will it take? What can we do to make it happen sooner rather than later? These are questions that AAUW has been grappling with for decades. As we mark Equal Pay Day on March 31st, perhaps there is hope that we can make progress in decreasing the gender pay gap in 2021, given a new administration that is committed to social justice and leveling the growing disparity between the haves and have nots. We also now have women in the highest echelons of national leadership; and as we all know, when women are in charge, things get done!

According to the 2020 update to AAUW's *The Simple Truth*, it will take white women until the year 2069 to achieve parity with men based on the projected earnings ratio compiled between 1988-2019. For women of color the numbers are even worse. Black women will have to wait until the year 2369 – 350 years – as their earnings ratio has only advanced a mere 7% from 1988-2019. And Latinas find themselves in the worse scenario as their earnings ratio has only increased 4% from 51% to 55% during this period of time, projecting their year of parity to 2451! (AAUW, *The Simple Truth* 2020 update)

The reasons for these disparities in the gender wage gap are known – and understanding what's causing the problem is the first step to meeting it head on. Members are urged to read the summary of *The Simple Truth* update on our National website which lays out the problem, its causes and solutions.

Tech Trek News

Happy February. The month of love, vaccines, optimism and here, in our area Spring flowers!

We reported last month that our Tech Trek Committee had decided to opt out of the virtual camp offered by the state committee this year and instead provide a STEM opportunity to Santa Cruz County Girls. We will look forward to Tech Trek's residential camp next year in 2022.

We are very grateful to Susan Chollar, our inhouse recently retired Science Education expert who has developed the program we will use this summer.

During July 2021, AAUW Santa Cruz will introduce a selected group of campers to the fascinating world of nature journaling. Our goal is to get our girls off their devices and outdoors where they will practice the science of making and recording careful observations about natural phenomena.

The girls will be guided through their four-week adventure by John Muir Laws, a noted Bay area naturalist and science educator. Laws has produced a series of short videos (*The Nature Journal Connection*) that are designed to introduce young people to the art and science of nature journaling.

Our "camp" will be carried out through socially distanced interactions. There will be no in-person meetings, however, the girls will have many opportunities to get to know each other and to share their ideas via two digital platforms: weekly Zoom meetings and Padlet, a digital bulletin board where they will post, view and comment upon each other's journal entries.

The campers will begin each "lesson" by watching one 15-minute episode of *The Nature Journal Connection*. They will follow Laws' prompts to get outside, observe and create one or more journal entries. Each camper will photograph and post her work on Padlet. If a camper lacks the technology to photograph and post, she will post a written summary of her work on the Padlet board. To encourage connections and collaboration, the campers will view and comment on each other's work. The campers will complete two lessons each week for a total of eight lessons. At the end of each week the campers and the camp directors (our AAUW Tech Trek committee members) will meet on Zoom to share their ideas and their experiences. The committee will guide the discussions and also use this time to give additional instruction and answer any questions that the girls might have.

There will be no cost to the girls. Through your generosity we will be able to provide the materials cost per girl, enabling a larger number of interested girls to participate in the program. We will invite Tech Trek alums from 2017 and 2018, girls nominated in 2019 (camp cancelled because of the virus) and 2020 7th grade girls nominated by county teachers.

We will be asking Tech Trek Alum, Danika Marlett and her Women in Science Soquel High group, as well as several other TT alums to engage with the girls in our local STEM program as mentors.

As Danika is now working with WISE at UCSC, there may also be an opportunity for that group to offer support to our 2021 program.

If any of you would like to be a part of helping young women in their STEM journey, please let us know. Can you share your STEM experience, or do you know of someone who can? Do you know of a volunteer project in the STEM area that a middle school or high school girl might be a part of? All ideas are welcome.
