

# President's Message



# 2020-21 Legislative Session Winding Down How Did AAUW California-sponsored Bills Fare?

Note: I believe this is the first time in many years our branch members participated in Lobby Day which was held in March. As a follow up to that, I thought this article from our state Public Policy Committee on how many of our sponsored bills were approved, postponed, or became part of next year's budget, might be of particular interest.

Not particularly well, as it turns out! We started the year off with 39 bills we selected for varying degrees of support. We chose one bill to co-sponsor, AB 92 (establishing a sliding scale for family fees for childcare through 2023), with four additional bills for top-priority attention ("A" level), five bills for "important" status ("B" level), twenty-two bills for low ("C" level) attention, and seven bills to "watch."

Overall, 28 of our 39 bills have been designated "2-year" bills, which means they are dead for this year and likely will be taken up again in 2022. Our advocate, Kathy Van Osten, has explained that this is because **Senate and Assembly leadership set a limit of just 12 bills that a member could move to the second house, so members had to pick and choose what would they wanted to move forward.** 

Three of our sponsored bills were signed by the Governor. They were AB 62 (upgrade garment worker wages), AB 367 (free menstrual products), and AB 887 (allows domestic violence restraining orders to be filed electronically).

Some of our bills did not make the cut. Four of our five top priority bills, along with our co-sponsored bill, and four of our other bills, did not make it through. These include AB 22, AB 92, AB 737, AB 966, AB 1361 (all promoting varied preschool and transitional kindergarten issues), and SB 245 (no cost-sharing for abortion services). However, several of them were converted into the Budget and Budget "trailer bills," which will provide funding for childcare. Although we were not entirely successful in getting our top bill AB 92 passed, the state budget includes \$60 million for one year of relief for all families using subsidized childcare, increased reimbursement rates for childcare providers, and funding for 206,000 new childcare slots.

The Governor vetoed the following bills: AB 123 (paid family leave), AB 1074 (rehire displaced workers), and AB 1461 (health services for non-citizens).

Thanks again to all our members who participated in Lobby Day and/or weighed in at critical junctures on social media. For descriptions of each of these bills and information on their status, visit our AAUW CA Bill Tracker on the website at:

Note: The original article was written before the Governor reviewed all of this session's bills. I have updated the article with the results of the Governor's actions. Watch for news about 2022 Lobby Day, coming in the spring. LN

# Human Trafficking Committee News

Several years ago our committee was fortunate in having the organization Shared Hope be our presenter. Shared Hope has just released the 2021 Human Trafficking State Report documenting the United States progress from 2011 to 2019 in curtailing and preventing trafficking. I strongly recommend the site **Shared Hope Just Conference Plenary held Nov 19th**. The program is online and tape recorded with excellent overviews and speakers on issues and policies the organization is recommending to the national audience. As stated before, this issue is bipartisan with a study that was able to carefully document what all states have done in this period of time. As you will see, progress was made. The highlights of the study reveal that states were organized as to Tiers. California ranked the last in the first Tier with Florida receiving the highest score. California was able to gain points featuring the issues of prevention and training. Our committee has emphasized these two issues so we feel we are on the right track. The letter grade for California was a D, so we can certainly improve in the next go-around. 40 US states received an F. 
