The number of women in the field of Astronomy and Astrophysics has grown significantly in recent years. In 2017, 33 percent of astronomy bachelors' degrees and 40 percent of astronomy doctorates went to women; however, there is still much work to do at senior levels. Additionally, although the number of White women has grown, representation is still poor for Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) communities. Women of color especially struggle with the effects of this "double jeopardy" in their STEM careers. Efforts for diversity, equity, and inclusion have increased to the point where now long-established organizations (e.g., professional societies, university departments, and funding agencies) are moving to support the improvement of representation in Physics and Astronomy. Dr. Norman will discuss some of these ongoing efforts, note where changes have occurred, and highlight areas where more effort is needed.



**GUEST SPEAKER:** Dr. Dara Norman, is an astrophysicist and a recognized leader in diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI). She holds a B.S. in Earth, Atmospheric and Planetary Science from MIT, and M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in Astronomy from the University of Washington.

In addition to her personal astronomy research, Dr. Norman is a prominent diversity advocate and the Deputy Director of the Community Science and Data Center at NOIRLab (National Optical-Infrared Astronomy Research Laboratory),\* which manages telescopes and astronomical data distribution at observatories in Arizona, Hawaii and Chile. In this role, she works on establishing and implementing recruitment and retention initiatives for minorities and women in astronomy. She is one of approximately only 20 African-American astronomers in the world at present.

She also serves as a member of the American Astronomical Society's Committee on the Status of Minorities in Astronomy. She has served as an expert panelist in a number of National Academy of Sciences studies, which have culminated in the Academies' 2013 report on advancing women of color in academia and a 2018 report on sexual harassment in the sciences.

\*NOIRLab is the preeminent US national center for ground-based, nighttime optical and infrared Astronomy. The Association of Universities for Research in Astronomy, Inc. (AURA) operates these facilities and NSF's NOIRLab under a cooperative agreement with the National Science Foundation (NSF).

## **Childcare: An Overdue and Critical Investment**

"It's past time that we treat childcare as what it is – an element whose contribution to economic growth is as essential as infrastructure or energy...and the single most important thing we can do to build a stronger economy over the next several decades," says Janet Yellen, the former Chair of the Federal Reserve Bank and now Secretary of the Treasury.

The state of U.S. childcare is deplorable compared with other developed nations, especially with respect to affordability. This fact has been brought home to us ever more vividly during the current pandemic. Women, who still bear the majority of childcaring, have left the workforce in the millions due to the absence of basic childcare services and the cost associated with it.

Here are some sobering statistics:

- 56% of married families with children under 6 consist of households where both parents work.
- The employment rate for single mothers raising a young child is 65%; it's 83% for single fathers who maintain custody.
- The average American family with at least one child under 5 uses 13% of their income to pay for childcare.
- Less than 20% of children eligible for a low-income federal assistance program are getting the funding.
- 50% of Americans live in childcare "deserts" or areas where there are three children per every childcare opening.
- In 24 states the average cost for infant full-time daycare exceeds the average cost of rent.
- 97% of childcare providers are women, who are disproportionally women of color, making less than a living wage with no guaranteed benefits. In the US, the mean hourly wage for childcare workers is \$12.88, nearly \$3.00 less per hour than parking lot attendants, and \$5.00 less per hour than dog groomers.

This is a textbook example of a broken market, whereby the benefits of providing a service (in this case childcare) are not included in its overall value. Are our children really less important than our cars and dogs?

The consequences of not investing in quality childcare should have most Americans demanding action from their government leaders. Neglecting the care of young children is detrimental to their physical and mental wellbeing; it reduces productivity in the workforce; leads to lost wages and reduced retirement benefits for parents; it adds to the downward pressure on childcare workers, which in turn, impacts the quality and stability of childcare; and restricts future educational opportunities for family members.

There is hope on the horizon! The Build Back Better Act, now awaiting action by the Senate would provide universal preschool with high-quality childcare for 3-and 4-year-olds; increase wages for early childhood educators; upgrade existing childcare facilities, especially in high-need areas; and provide a sliding scale whereby parents would pay a reasonable percentage of their overall income to childcare costs.

Whether the legislation is included in the Reconciliation bill or taken up as a stand-alone bill, it deserves passage and your support. **Childcare relief remains the top priority of AAUW California this year.** Please be sure to contact your Senator and let them know of your AAUW membership and your commitment to ensuring our Nation's future.

AAUW is calling on the 117th Congress to ensure that a permanent paid leave program, childcare funding and the Child Tax Credit are included in the budget reconciliation process.

# **AAUW Is Nonpartisan, but has Always Been Political**

AAUW's mission is to advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy. AAUW, founded in 1881, has a long history of advocacy:

1935 Supported legalizing physicians' dispensation of contraceptive information.

1945 AAUW member Representative Chase Woodhouse (D-CT) introduced the first proposed federal equal pay legislation.

1964 Members worked to pass the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

1972 Instrumental in the passage of Title IX.

1993 Advocated for the passage of the Family and Medical Leave Act.

2009 Provided critical support resulting in President Obama signing the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act.

## **AAUW National:**



- Takes political stands, dictated by member-adopted Public Policy Priorities,
- Endorses legislation based on these priorities,
- Uses advocacy to influence legislative debate on critical issues affecting women and girls,

Born and raised in Salt lake City to a Mormon mother and Catholic father, she was the 6th of 7 children.

Her upbringing involved a unique blend of spiritual thought. She was educated in Catholic schools, sometimes feeling socially isolated as a member of a religious minority.

After earning a BA in history from the University of Utah, Susan spent two years as a flight attendant for United Airlines, based in Chicago, and traveled to many places in the United States.

To develop spiritually, she traveled to India in 1972 and visited an ashram to study Transcendental Meditation. Upon her return, she earned an AA degree in art--and in later years got an MFA also.

Always interested in theology and spirituality as a result of her family background, she then attended the Berkeley Graduate Theological Union, earning an MA in Theology.

An accomplished artist, Susan worked as a graphic artist for several years and then received an MA in Instructional Technology, which she put to use teaching comparative religion for several years at De Anza College.

She married in 1989. Her husband also taught at De Anza. A Social Science instructor, he had been a Catholic priest, but left the priesthood to marry Susan.

In 1991, the couple moved to Scotts Valley. Her husband died in 2015, and she remained in Scotts Valley, sharing her home with her beloved poodle, "Blue".

Susan's art and writing reflect spiritual, feminist, and ecological themes. Writing as Susan Cafarelli, she published "The Cross Symbol", which is available on Amazon.

Interviewing Susan was a stimulating experience . Her life of creativity and learning is inspiring.
